

Breast-feeding backers step up fight vs comm'l greed

LOCAL ADVOCACY GROUPS HAVE stepped up their offensive against giant international milk formula companies, forming what they called a "grand alliance against corporate greed and predatory commercial interests."

The coalition of at least 11 Filipino groups is backed by counterparts from Geneva, London, Boston and Canada, such as the Baby Milk Action and the Infant Feeding Action Coalition (Infact) and the International Baby Food Action Network (Ibfan).

Local members include Nurturers of the Earth Inc., Arugaan, Liga ng mga Barangay ng Pilipinas, Philippine Pharmaceutical Association, Pro-Life and Our Lady of La Leche Move-

Objective

The alliance's primary goal is to take milk formula companies to task for alleged violations of Executive Order No. 51 or the Milk Code.

Nona Andaya-Castillo, director of Nurturers of the Earth Inc., said she had been monitoring "palpable violations" of the Milk Code by infant formula companies since 1977.

She cited the provisions barring companies from giving "directly or indirectly gifts of any sort" to the general public or to pregnant and nursing mothers. She mentioned one American company, which allegedly sponsored a "Parenting 101" class for parents at a top hospital in Pasig City.

Dr. Elvira Henares-Esguerra, director of Children for Breastfeeding Inc., was unfazed by the existing temporary restraining order imposed by the Supreme Court on the revised implementing rules and regulations of the Milk Code.

Morality

"This is a public health issue, a moral issue involving public good versus private gain, and public health against corporate greed," she said in the alliance's statement to the Inquir-

The coalition is banking on the US Foreign Corrupt Practices Act of 1977 to prosecute milk companies. The group said the law imposed an audit procedure that could purportedly catch an "improper payment of even one paper clip."

Using the act as basis, "the coalition hopes to send at least one official of a US milk company in the Philippines to jail with the help of the US Department of Justice and Securities and Exchange Commission," it said in a state
